I. Course: COSC 3340 / 6309 - Intro. to Automata and Comp

- A. Catalog Description: Declared Computer Science majors and minors, and Computer Engineering majors. Concepts in automata theory and theory of computation.

Design grammars and recognizers for different formal languages. Prove or disprove theorems in automata theory using its properties. Determine the decidability and intractability of computational problems
